Project Profile: TEEN CHALLENGE by Debbie Bollinger

LOCATION: 747 Samuels Ave., just NE of downtown Ft. Worth

As far as 'Secret Gardens' go, Fort Worth Teen Challenge Garden is a hidden jewel nestled on a quiet residential street two miles from downtown Fort Worth.

In the early 1900's, Samuels Avenue was once upon a time the address of choice. Although the stately homes have long disappeared, the remnants of extensive gardens leading down to the river can still be found.



Teen Challenge Garden offers many different types of gardening experiences; but in many ways is still a diamond in the rough. There is so much untapped potential just waiting for the right Master Gardener/Intern to come along and share in the vision with fresh ideas and inspiration. There are raised beds for vegetable, fruit and herb gardening, two long connecting beds with Texas Natives and functioning dry creek beds that help with drainage, a large berm with perennials and annuals, undeveloped shade gardens, a children's play yard (in much need of child friendly plants and vines), two beds of Earthkind roses, a composting area and plans for a greenhouse to be constructed this April.

Master Gardeners are welcome to come and work, weed, prune and plant anytime they choose. The residents of Teen Challenge work with us in the garden on Wednesdays from 9:00-10:00 am; making this an especially rewarding time to come. They love learning about the plants and are appreciative of the Master Gardeners who take time to teach them. They especially love when its time to harvest the fruit and vegetables.

Even if you're unable to invest your time, we are always grateful for pass along plants and donations of any size (MG Raffle is our only funding); so please keep Teen Challenge in mind.

President Stanek called the Business Meeting to order at 10:40 a.m. with 243 certified members and interns present, and welcomed the 2009 Intern Class to the Meeting and annual "Hotdog Lunch" honoring them.

In Her Own Words:

The Master Gardener program was an anchor and life changing for me. The 3 years after I certified, I spent answering the phone on Wednesdays with Jim Beeler. What a mentor and extraordinary person. I learned much from Jim and he had my back on many a strange call. I have enjoyed passing that on to others by helping with the telephone training of the interns. Then stepped in my next mentor Eleanor Tuck, Telephone Coordinator extraordinaire. ET, as we all call her, has guided me from the first time I worked with her. She might say...drug me down the garden path or kept me in line with a baseball bat. She is a mentor, teacher and treasured friend. I have been an Intern Advisor for many classes, Telephone Trainer for 5 plus years, I Chair the Project Review Committee, I'm a Propagation Specialist and I am on my 4th class to follow through the program as Intern Coordinator. Here lies my love. I get to meet the new interns, guide them thru their intern year, and see them become certified. I'm a people person and I guess of all the programs..the interns are my passion. With being the coordinator, comes the choosing of the advisors and staff. The

advisors are the backbone of the program. Surround yourself with good, energetic people and learn to delegate duties. These are the people who keep me in line and make my job easy. I'm just the glue. Making new friendships, working with the Extension Agents, and the Extension staff, learning and participating as a Tarrant County Master Gardener has enriched my life and broadened my knowledge.

My husband, Roger retired last March. Retirement is interesting. While he was working volunteering was no problem. Now he just asks where are you going today? I'm working on getting him to join the program, but right now he enjoys working around the house. As with most of our spouses, he supports me in all I do, and you can't ask for more than that. I lived in Nagoya, Japan for 18 months with Roger's job (1991-92). I studied Ikebana during this time, and I was 1st VP of the Nagoya Chapter of Ikebana. Ikebana is Japanese Floral Design. I continued to study Ikebana, both Sogetsu and Ohara Schools. I have a teacher's certificate in Sogetsu School. While in Tokyo I was on the Executive Board of Ikebana International. {This was quite an honor, as there are only 2 foreigners on the broad.} I served as 2nd VP for 2 1/2 years and as 3rd VP for 1 year. I represented Ikebana International at the American Embassy Tea in Japan, and also was 1 of 2 who represented the North American Conference at the 2000 International Convention. I attended many Ikenbna conferences in various countries. What an opportunity for a small town girl.

TIMEKEEPER, PART 2

Verifying Your Activity Hours

The Timekeepers are not perfect!! Please be sure to periodically verify that the hours you have submitted are correctly reported in the Timekeeping Database. It is a whole lot easier if problems are identified during the year rather than waiting until the end of the year. The Timekeepers took a poll of their contacts and 80% of those responding either wanted this information posted on the website or didn't care whether or not it was posted.

Major points to know:

- ▶ The Activity Time Report is on the TCMGA Website with the approval of the Advisory Board. The information is presented using MG Numbers and not names. It will be the responsibility of the MGs and Interns to monitor this report to be sure their information is correct.
- ▶ MGs and Interns may contact their Timekeeper or the Head Timekeeper to get their MG Number.
- ▶ MGs and Interns who do not have email addresses may verify the accuracy of their information at the Extension Office on the MG Desk computers or by requesting this information from their Timekeeper or the Head Timekeeper.
- ▶ If the MG or Intern believes that there is an error in the information, please contact your Timekeeper to resolve the problem. The Timekeeper may refer questions to the Head Timekeeper for resolution.
- ▶ Updated reports will be posted around the 20th of the month and will reflect hours reported by the 5th of that month.

Project Locator on Website:

We've developed a project locator for the TCMGA website which provides maps for the location of all of our projects. To use it, you:

1. Enter the TCMGA website
2. Click on Member Hot Key
3. Locate the entry in bold, “Project Locations”
4. Click on the link that says "click here for information on how and where to volunteer, including maps to project locations."
5. That takes you to a list of the projects. The projects are listed by their general geographic location within Tarrant County, i.e., Southwest, Northeast, Central, etc. The details of the project include the name of its Project Manager and its address.
6. You locate the project you want to find and then click on its address. That takes you to a MapQuest page that locates the project for you within Tarrant County.

I worked on the Project Committee with Judy Ratzlaff and we determined that such a map would be a good way to let our folks know where all our projects were. I developed the prototype and then Kate Kilmurray developed the implementation for the web site. Kate did a super job implementing the solution for the web site and deserves a lot of credit.
